

# How A Majestic Bird is Helping to Boost the U. S. Economy ... and, Quite Possibly, Your Financial Future as Well.



Dear Patriotic Friend,

Deep in the hills of Tennessee, in a place called Pigeon Forge, lays the home of a majestic Bald Eagle named "*Challenger*". Named in honor of the lost space shuttle, *Challenger* was blown from his nest in Louisiana when he was only five weeks old. Well-meaning folks found him, rescued him and hand-raised him. However, due to the close contact with his rescuers, he forever imprinted on humans and now cannot be released into the wild.

Today *Challenger* serves as an inspirational free-flying educational ambassador for his once-endangered species. He resides at the nonprofit American Eagle Foundation located at Dollywood, **Dolly Parton's** family entertainment park in Tennessee.

The American Eagle Foundation (AEF) is a nonprofit rescue operation that was founded in 1985. Its mission is to restore and protect eagle habitats. It is a federally licensed caregiver to over 60 birds of prey at any given time. It saves and tends to birds that are injured or orphaned. Where possible, it releases these birds back to the wild. Those that are nonreleasable are cared for and reside permanently at the facility.

AEF operates the largest Bald Eagle breeding facility in the world and has released dozens of captive-hatched eaglets into the Great Smokey Mountains area. Periodically, the AEF hosts "release parties" where locals gather to watch these wonderful birds fly off into the mountains for the first time.

Celebrities are getting into the act as well. Last spring two young eaglets hatched from nonreleasable parents. **Miley Cyrus** (AKA *Hannah Montana*) and her dad, **Billy Ray Cyrus**, named the two birds *Hope* and *Tennessee*. In July, the 14-week old eaglets were released into the wild.

Meanwhile, *Challenger* and fellow nonreleasable birds of prey travel with their handlers all across the U. S. performing and educating generations about their species. *Challenger* is such a crowd-pleaser he has even inspired a song composed by songwriter, James Rogers, entitled *When Challenger Flies*.

**On December 23, 2004, President George W. Bush signed into law an act commissioning the United States Mint to mint and issue three commemorative coins.**

These coins were struck to celebrate the recovery of the Bald Eagle species and their subsequent removal from the Endangered Species List.

The Second Continental Congress of the U. S. made the Bald Eagle the centerpiece of the Great Seal of the United States. This magnificent creature has come to symbolize America's freedom, strength and democracy.

In January 2008, the United States Mint issued the \$5 Gold Bald Eagle commemorative coin, the Silver Dollar Bald Eagle commemorative coin and the Silver half-dollar Bald Eagle commemorative coin. The coins were released as a tribute to the bird that became the National Emblem of the United States in 1782.

### **U. S. Mint Raises \$7 Million to Protect Bald Eagles**

The start of the commemorative series also coincided with the 35<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Endangered Species Act of 1973 that helped the eagle thrive in its natural habitat. Surcharges from coin sales help to build an endowment fund to protect America's national bird for future generations. Sales of this series has already raised \$7 million for that cause.

Poaching, habitat destruction, pesticides and food source contamination took their toll on the bald eagle population. At the founding of our nation, the eagle population numbered approximately 100,000 nesting pairs. By the early 1960s there were only 400 nesting pairs of bald eagles left.

The path to recovery took the efforts of governments, private organizations and citizens who were determined to save our national emblem. Efforts such as captive breeding and nest-watching programs provided vital protection, enabling the bald eagle to survive.

Happily, by 2007, bald eagle numbers reached about 10,000 nesting pairs, and the bird was removed from the Endangered Species list. Bald Eagles can now be found soaring majestically throughout the continental United States, Alaska and Canada.

Since the commemorative coin program began in 1982, the United States Mint has raised over \$418 billion in surcharges to help build museums, maintain national monuments like the Vietnam War Memorial, preserve historical sites like George Washington's home, support various Olympic programs, and much more.

On December 12, 2008, the U. S. Mint announced it would no longer sell these commemorative coins. Of the 100,000 original \$5 gold coins, **only 29,000 remain**. Of the original 500,000 silver dollar coins and 750,000 half-dollar silver coins, **only 120,000 remain** in the three-coin collection.

### **Uncirculated Coins**

All uncirculated coins are certified and graded by ANACS, one of the premier coin grading services in America. They are graded on a 70-point scale with 70 being supreme perfection. There are absolutely NO flaws or marks on the coin, meaning it was one of the few coins struck perfectly and then identified as perfect Brilliant Uncirculated-70 condition (abbreviated MS-70).

To protect the coins and guarantee their grade into the future, they are encased in a tamper-proof holder. The holder includes a label identifying the coin and its grade. Then the coin is displayed in a custom wooden presentation case with a hinged lid.
